NAPO is extremely concerned that the legitimate and well-demonstrated needs of officers are being overlooked due to the optics of law enforcement agencies obtaining this equipment from the Department of Defense. This gear, which has been repurposed for public safety use, fulfills legitimate police needs and the lack of such gear can have lifethreatening consequences for officers and the communities they serve.
